


Tim have been busy growing tomato plants (pictured on left) for the annual charity sale. As ever, there is a

Did you know

In January Granta Medical Practice's clinicians saw / spoke to 20,256 patients. This number includes urgent appointments, routine appointments and telephone appointments. Unfortunately, there were an extra 1,026 appointments that patients did not attend (DNA). February's appointments totalled 17,876, but again there were an additional DNA's – 1,043!

Sometimes it can be difficult keeping to an appointment date and time. However, if you ring and cancel even half an hour beforehand the surgery would be able to reuse your slot for another patient.
