


### **BEE SWARMS**

We are at that time of the year when bees swarm. A honeybee colony swarming

is a natural process. It's the colony reproducing by the old queen leaving with some of the bees. They leave their hive and find somewhere to hang in a cluster until the scout bees decide on their new home.

If you think you've got a swarm please call a local beekeeper to come and remove the honeybees. The nearest registered swarm collectors to the Chishills are





It is a free service, the swarm collector will be a beekeeper and will use the swarm to increase his own collection of hives, provided it is a honeybee swarm and not wasps! Please call promptly, if you leave it the bees will move on, but usually to somewhere much more inaccessible, like inside a nearby chimney or roof space, where they may be more of a nusiance and where, perhaps, the colony will need to be destroyed.

# TREES IN GREAT CHISHILL



Spring is upon us. It is a time of rapid growth and you may be tempted to cut back new growth on your trees. Please be aware that, since much of Great Chishill is а designated conservation area, there may be restrictions on what you can do. In a conservation area all trees which are larger than 75 mm in diameter (3") at a height of 1.5 meters (5') are treated in the same way as trees anywhere that have a Tree Preservation Order. This means that you are prohibited from carrying out any of the following actions without getting consent from SCDC Planning Department:

> cutting down topping lopping uprooting wilful damage wilful destruction.

The last two items on this list do seem to me to be somewhat unnecessary. I don't think you would seek written permision (or be granted it) if they were your intention!

Use your common sense. Light pruning is OK, but if you have any doubts please contact the village Tree Warden, Tim Scott, on 01783 837112.

### **ADOPT A TREE**

There is now a wonderful opportunity for Chishill children to 'Adopt a Tree'. There are now a range of species represented in the chalk pit. Silver birch, hazel, oak, hornbeam and maple. They arrived unlabelled, so it is a guessing game! Just email me, ruth.dibblee@btinternet.com with your name, address and number of children in your family. An envelope will be delivered containing an aluminium tag on which to write your child's name. There are 150 new saplings in the chalk pit to choose from, so depending on demand, village grandchildren will also have an opportunity at a later date.

However, this has to be at your risk and needs adult supervision. There are about 50 mammal-holes around the Pit, homes to previous fox, badger and rabbit residents; traps for the unwary!

### TRISTRAM'S TROUBLES

The latest event at the Crossroads is the arrival of a specialist Newbury firm thunderously hammer-pile driving 'Heli Piles' into the site of Tristram's wall - to protect his now pollarded lime trees.

Tristram has not had much luck with South Cambs Planning Department. He was asked to tear down and replace his newly-built chimney stack, due to mistakenly using bricks not to the Planning Department's specification.

He has now been placed in a Catch 22 situation, as the Tree Officer is determined to protect his pollarded limes. The limes were pushing over Tristram's flint wall, which was then condemned by Cambridgeshire County Council - but which also required replacement. Rather perversely, South Cambs District Council initially refused permission for the flint wall to be rebuilt (even though the County Council was demanding it) because it needed listed building planning consent. The Tree Officer objected to the limes' removal. Stalemate for more than a year. The Tree Officer then

specified an intricate way of building the wall foundations, using the Heli Pile system, to protect the tree roots. This technology has so far, we understand, never before been used to protect pollarded lime trees.

There are now 52 documents lodged at SCDC relating to this, with "many internal meetings" and many more redacted. The Head of Planning has





now said he will not answer any more emails on the subject. Poor Tristram has had to meet all the, fairly substantial, costs of this work himself. You might commiserate with Tristram if passing.
