#### Our Councillors report....

Our reports to the parish council tend to revolve around continuing budget cuts and the not-always-smooth management of ultra-fast growth in the Greater Cambridge area - including the question mark over the South Cambs Local Plan, which renders the district somewhat vulnerable to speculative planning applications. Meanwhile, it seems that councils need to consult us endlessly about proposed cuts, and we find ourselves on something of a merrygo-round.

From a day-to-day practical perspective, it is always good to hear directly from you about what is and isn't working so that we can feed back, nudge, and seek improvements. A case in point is the new charges at Park and Ride: people have asked us why the charging structure and ticket machines are so complicated. It is possible to pay in advance on-line, though it would be even better if one could purchase advance credit to use as and when, especially given that the day rate is £1. Transport in all its forms continues to be a pressing concern for small rural villages. From people with disabilities that prevent them being able to drive, we've heard good suggestions for improving the 'Access to Work' programme - which provides taxi transport to work.

On the cycling front, the A10 Corridor Cycling Campaign has spawned a great many ideas for the wider corridor, but it has also generated new interest in tandem pilot riding for Camsight, so that cyclists with visual impairment can get out and enjoy the pleasures of cycling too.

Our next meeting takes place on 15 October, 7PM for 7:30, at the Coombes Community Centre in Royston, and everyone is welcome.

We hold a drop-in advice surgery at the Melbourn Hub on the first Monday of the month, 2:30-3:30. The Melbourn Hub is opposite the High Street public car park.
