CHALK NOT CLUNCH

Clunch is 'wet' chalk. compressed at the base of porous chalk and underlying impermeable marl clay along the spring-line - the reason why Chishill was inhabited in the early days. This wet chalk was easily carved and used for the intricate gothic window-frames of the Cambridge Colleges. Once dry, its compression set it solid. Cherry Hinton and Orwell had **lucrative** seams of clunch. Unfortunately, the Great Chishill chalk pit had failed to produce clunch, possibly due to the lack of a

geologist in the village (there are now three).


Chalk from the pit was used for surfacing roads (see 1903 picture), dazzling in summer and slippery in winter. Pothole repairs, unlike today, fell to users. Old maps show a lime-kiln in the pit to the north, providing mortar for the flint walls.

Domestic scrap removed from the pit indicates the level of poverty in the village - worn-out saucepans and kettles, and repeatedly mended washbasins. Small jars of meatpaste were a rare treat and saucebottles needed to liven up a

monotonous diet of mutton stew.

A trip to Royston by cart would have taken half a day, time ill-afforded from a 6-day working week. Today it takes 10 minutes.

St Swithun's Collapse

While we are thinking about Great Chishill history, many of you know about the Reverend Griffenhoofe, who was the Victorian vicar who presided over the collapse of the church tower in 1892. He didn't like the unsightly iron bands around the tower and he persuaded the church wardens to allow the bands to be removed, thus causing the collapse which the bands had been installed to prevent!

I have come across this photograph, taken at the time, which shows the collapsed tower. There is a short history of the church (available in the church) written by our very own expert historian, Celina Fox, as part of the recent tower restoration project.
